On behalf of the Editorial Committee of ILI Law Review, I take this opportunity to introduce the *Summer Issue* of 2023. I would first like to thank the whole Editorial Committee and faculty advisors for their continuous support. The Editorial Committee has been constantly refining the editorial process to ensure the most efficient and satisfying experience for, both, Authors and Reviewers. The hard labour of the members of the Editorial Committee has resulted in escalation of journal's reputation and visibility in the academic community in the short span of time.

I would like to express gratefulness to all our Authors for their valuable contribution and would also like to acknowledge the generous help that both the Authors and Editorial Committee obtained from the peer Reviewers from time to time. Our team of Reviewers is our backbone and they all deserve special mention for giving us their valuable time and helping ILI Law Review in achieving great milestones. The names of the Reviewers are listed in the 'Acknowledgements to Reviewers' on our main page. The Editorial Committee update this 'List of Reviewers' after the release of the new issue.

In this issue, we are bringing for our readers, a diverse selection of stimulating readings from various scholars, legal professionals, and students. We have manuscripts from one LL.B. student, three LL.M. students, five Ph.D. scholars, five Assistant Professors, three Associate Professors, and two Professors. The Issue, adhering to the inclusivity, is publishing papers from five National Law Universities, from Jodhpur, Mumbai, Andhra Pradesh, Delhi, and Goa. It also includes papers from five Central Universities, two state Universities and two private Universities. Around seventy five articles were considered by the Editorial Committee for this issue, which went through three stages of screening process; initial screening, plagiarism test and blind-peer reviews. As per ILILR's policy, the team followed a double blind peer review process for each entry where identity of authors and reviewers were not revealed to each other. For this Summer Issue, the entire review and revision process took around eight – nine months. The review process engaged around 95 subject experts in the review process. The entire review process is carefully structured so as to minimize possibility of bias, conflict and any competing interest.

As per the policy of the journal, articles are processed on 'first come first served' basis. Case comments, legislative comments and book reviews, on the other hand, are processed considering the relevancy of the content at the time of publication. We are publishing this note in the interest of transparency and publication ethics. The 'date of receipt' of each manuscript is also provided below to further maintain transparency. These dates are when the Editorial Committee received the manuscript at their official

email address for the first time. We are happy to put on record that before the publication of the present Issue, we had published a special issue on “Non-Humans” in 2023.
